

Project HOPE Research Publications and References

Dissertation and Academic Publications

Mark K. Cox's primary work on this topic is his **Doctor of Business Administration (DBA) dissertation** at Pepperdine Graziadio Business School, titled "*Project HOPE: The Impact of Coaching and Transformation Among Returning Citizens*" (2025) ¹. This dissertation, supervised by Dr. Cristina B. Gibson, is the foundational study exploring how a prison-based cognitive coaching program can foster **psychological transformation** and improve post-release outcomes for incarcerated individuals (often called "returning citizens") ². The dissertation employed qualitative interviews to trace participants' journeys "from surviving to thriving" through hope formation and personal transformation in a prison coaching program. Cox developed a new framework describing the transformation process for participants who have reentered society with very low recidivism, securing employment and other wellness indicators. The findings suggest that **cognitive coaching programs in prisons can materially improve the likelihood of post-release success**, by instilling hope, self-efficacy, identity, and dignity in participants ³ ⁴. These findings are significant given U.S. recidivism rates of 50–80% and highlight a potential strategy for correctional leaders to reduce recidivism ⁵ ⁶.

The full dissertation is publicly available via Pepperdine's digital repository ⁷ and via ProQuest. In it, Cox documents the context of *Project HOPE* as a peer-led coaching initiative inside a federal prison (FCI McKean). Notably, the dissertation explains that a cohort of "pioneering" inmate graduates of an initial coaching program went on to create a **customized peer coaching program called the HOPE Coaching Project (HCP)** – with *HOPE* as an acronym for "Helping Other People Evolve" ⁸. This inmate-developed program became the basis for Cox's study of transformational change among "returning citizens." At the time of this writing, no peer-reviewed journal articles by Cox and Gibson have been *publicly* identified yet (beyond the dissertation itself), but the dissertation's recommended citation indicates it has been accepted in ProQuest Dissertations & Theses Global ⁹. It is likely that Cox and Gibson are preparing one or more manuscripts for academic journals, given the significant findings, but **no specific journal publication from this research is evident in 2025**. (A search of academic databases and Google Scholar did not reveal any published journal article by Cox & Gibson on this topic as of late 2025.)

Conference Papers and Presentations

Cox's research **has been presented at major academic conferences**, demonstrating its reach beyond the dissertation. Most prominently, Mark K. Cox was a presenter at the **2025 Academy of Management (AOM) Annual Meeting** (held in July 2025 in Copenhagen). His presentation, titled "*Hope Regained: Inspiration From Returning Citizens Recently Released from Prison*," was part of a symposium on "Barriers to Bridges: Celebrating Unique Contributions and Strategies of the Under-Represented" ¹⁰ ¹¹. In that session – chaired by Dr. Cristina Gibson of Pepperdine – Cox served as both an author and presenter, sharing insights from Project HOPE with the international management scholar community ¹² ¹³. The **AOM program listing** confirms Cox's role and the title of his paper, indicating Pepperdine University as his affiliation ¹¹.

This suggests that a peer-reviewed conference paper (or extended abstract) was submitted and accepted for AOM; indeed, the *Academy of Management Proceedings* for 2025 include Cox's work as part of that symposium (he is listed as a contributing author alongside others) ¹⁴ . Academy of Management is a highly selective conference, and Pepperdine's Graziadio School even highlighted this achievement: a June 2025 news release announced that **Cox and other Pepperdine Executive DBA members earned a prestigious spot at AOM 2025**, noting that Dr. Mark Cox (now an alumnus) would present original research on underrepresented groups at the conference ¹⁵ . This illustrates the academic validation and exposure of Project HOPE's findings.

Beyond AOM, we can infer Cox may have shared this work in other forums. For instance, the *International Coaching Federation (ICF)* or prison industry conferences (e.g. American Correctional Association, International Corrections and Prisons Association) are typical venues for such applied research, though specific evidence of those presentations was not found in our sources. One relevant event is the **National Returning Citizens Conference** (April 2025 in Columbus, OH) – a practitioner conference on reentry – but it's unclear if Cox's work was featured there. The core ideas of Project HOPE (using coaching to reduce recidivism) align with topics of interest in reentry summits and criminal justice reform panels, so Cox's research likely garnered attention in those circles as well (even if we do not have a specific program listing). The documented AOM presentation, however, is the clearest example of a formal conference paper derived from the dissertation.

Media Coverage and Press Releases

Media coverage of "Project HOPE" and Cox's research appears to be emerging, primarily in institutional and niche outlets. As mentioned, Pepperdine's Graziadio news article (June 10, 2025) served as a quasi-press release, celebrating the AOM conference participation ¹⁵ . This piece underscores Pepperdine's pride in the research's impact and notes Professor Gibson's mentorship of Cox and others in bringing their work to such forums ¹⁶ .

Outside academia, **Social Purpose Corrections (SPCOR)** – a nonprofit organization focused on prison reform and reentry – highlighted Cox's findings on their platform. Mark K. Cox is in fact noted as the CEO of Social Purpose Corrections (suggesting he is applying his research in practice). On the SPCOR website, an article titled "*Coaching as a Catalyst: Building a New Future for Corrections*" references Cox's 2025 dissertation, calling it "one of the most powerful narratives of transformation" in the corrections field ¹⁷ . The SPCOR commentary emphasizes that *coaching can act as a powerful catalyst, transforming not only the coachee (incarcerated individual), but also the coach, and ultimately the surrounding culture* – a summary that strongly echoes Cox's conclusions. (Note: The SPCOR site provides a PDF of Cox's dissertation for readers, further indicating their endorsement of his work ¹⁸ .) This can be seen as a form of media coverage in the social impact sector, bridging academic research to real-world application.

We did not find evidence of mainstream press coverage (e.g. major newspapers or TV) specifically about Project HOPE or Cox's study. However, **press releases or features might exist through criminal justice organizations or coaching networks**. For example, the **International Coaching Federation** or the **National Institute of Corrections** might have noted the trend of coaching in prisons, possibly citing work like Cox's (though no direct references were found in our search). There was a local news snippet (from 25News in Illinois) describing inmates benefiting from an emotional growth program, but it's unclear if that was related to Project HOPE. In the absence of traditional media articles, the dissemination appears to rely on academic/professional channels and the organizations led by Cox himself.

Additionally, the **Pepperdine Graziadio community** has likely circulated this success story internally. The Executive DBA program's web page lists Mark Cox and mentions his background (former Fortune 500 executive) and involvement in coaching initiatives ¹⁹ ²⁰, though it doesn't detail the Project HOPE research on that profile. Still, the combination of Pepperdine's news release and SPCOR's blog post acts effectively as press coverage, underlining the importance and novelty of the work.

Pepperdine Documentation and Support

Pepperdine University provides **official documentation of Cox's research** through its repositories and program materials. The dissertation is cataloged in Pepperdine's *Theses and Dissertations* collection (entry no. 1585) with an abstract and Library of Congress subject headings related to prisoner rehabilitation, recidivism, and ex-convict psychology ²¹ ²². The recommended citation is given on that page, affirming the work as a Pepperdine DBA dissertation accepted in May 2025 ⁷ ⁹. This ensures the research is discoverable and citable for future scholars.

Moreover, Pepperdine's **Graziadio Business School** has explicitly tied Cox's project to its mission. In the Graziadio Newsroom article about AOM 2025, the school notes that these research presentations (like Cox's) "embody the University's mission of purpose, service, and leadership" ²³. It highlights how the *EDBA program's academic rigor and mission-driven scholarship* are showcased by projects such as Project HOPE ²⁴. Such documentation from Pepperdine not only legitimizes the study but also positions it as a model of practitioner-oriented research making a positive societal impact.

No other specific Pepperdine web pages (beyond the repository and news blog) were found to detail Project HOPE, which is expected since the dissertation itself is the primary document. It's worth noting that Dr. Cristina Gibson, Cox's advisor, is a prominent scholar in organizational behavior; her CV lists supervision of the project ²⁵. This indicates institutional support at the faculty level. In summary, Pepperdine has preserved and promoted Cox's research through its digital library and communications, ensuring that "*Project HOPE: The Impact of Coaching and Transformation Among Returning Citizens*" is recognized as a significant scholarly contribution of the Graziadio School.

"The Core Four" and "HOPE Coaching Project" in Related Materials

Both "**The Core Four**" and "**The HOPE Coaching Project**" are mentioned in materials connected to Cox's work, as they represent concepts or programs emerging from the Project HOPE initiative:

- *The HOPE Coaching Project (HCP)*. This term appears frequently in the context of Cox's research. As noted in the dissertation, HCP was the name given to the peer-led coaching program developed by inmates at FCI McKean after the initial coaching intervention. The acronym stands for *Helping Other People Evolve*, encapsulating the program's purpose ⁸. HCP is essentially "**Project HOPE**" in **practice** – it was the vehicle through which inmate-coaches mentored others, and it became a subject of Cox's study. External documentation confirms its existence and origins: for example, Adam Clausen (a formerly incarcerated individual) is credited as the "*Creator and Facilitator of the HOPE Coaching Project peer-to-peer coaching program and training curriculum*" ²⁶. Clausen's efforts, which included a life coach training inside prison and then HCP, set the stage for the transformation stories in Cox's research. Thus, references to the HOPE Coaching Project in any article or website (such as the *HOPE Coaching Project* website itself, or reentry news) are directly relevant – they describe the

program that Cox and Gibson examined. In short, HCP is the practical program that **“Project HOPE” (the research)** is built upon. Materials discussing HCP (e.g. program overviews, policies on thehopecoachingproject.com) reinforce the credibility of the program: they note it was developed by inmates, at no cost to the Bureau of Prisons, to coach younger incarcerated men, etc. (as per the HOPE Coaching Project’s own descriptions). While the HOPE Coaching Project site wasn’t fully accessible at the moment, its existence and mission are well documented via the dissertation and Clausen’s account.

- *The Core Four.* The term “Core Four” appears in the context of reentry training programs. While not explicitly detailed in Cox’s dissertation, it is referenced on the **Legacy Impact Group** website, which is an organization involved in supporting individuals in transition (possibly co-founded or advised by Cox). Legacy Impact Group mentions **“initiatives like The Core Four and HOPE Coaching Project”** in tandem – indicating that “The Core Four” is another program or curriculum used to develop key skills for participants ²⁷. According to the Legacy Impact description, through the Core Four and HCP, *participants gain communication, decision-making, and leadership skills*, among other benefits ²⁸. This suggests that **“The Core Four” is a model or program comprising four fundamental skill areas or principles** essential for personal development and reentry success. It might refer to a training module covering four core competencies (communication, decision-making, leadership, and perhaps a fourth like emotional intelligence or professionalism – the snippet cuts off at “alongside industry...” which likely alludes to industry-specific skills or certifications). In any case, the pairing of Core Four with the HOPE Coaching Project on that site implies that the Core Four could be a complementary curriculum to the coaching program. It could be Legacy Impact Group’s way of packaging the lessons learned from Project HOPE into an easily digestible framework for returning citizens.

In summary, **the HOPE Coaching Project is well-recognized in both academic and practitioner circles** as the peer-coaching program driving inmate transformation ⁸ ²⁶. “The Core Four” appears to be a related framework mentioned in practitioner documentation (Legacy Impact Group) focusing on core skill development for those reentering society ²⁷. Both terms are directly tied to the narrative of Project HOPE and are used in materials aiming to validate or extend Cox’s work. They demonstrate how the research has spawned or aligned with concrete programs for change: HCP within prison and Core Four as a broader reentry skill-building initiative.
